

Care of instruments

Pupils may have the chance to take instruments home from school for practice. If you have the instrument at home, we strongly advise that you:

- Insure it through your household contents policy or a specialist musical instrument insurance company.
- Take good care of it and follow advice given by the ArtForms teacher.
- Keep the instrument away from extremes of heat and cold.
- *Do not try to repair it yourself!* If it seems to be broken, don't panic. Our musician teachers can often carry out minor repairs or recommend a qualified technician (major damage is very rare). We also provide a repair service for schools.
- Only use recommended polishes, chemicals or oils.

How you can help your child

Good progress and enthusiasm go together. Your interest and encouragement will help, especially if the going becomes tough. All instruments need patience, especially when pupils are first beginning to learn.

Practice is essential if your child wants to improve. Ten minutes daily is enough to begin with. Pupils will be given instructions, but they may need a reminder from you. It will be best if you can set aside a regular time each day in a quiet space.



ArtForms

Instrumental/Vocal Lessons

These usually take place during the school day. You may be concerned about your child missing other lessons, however pupils learning to sing or play an instrument do as well, or better, in their other work than those who do not, so their other school work is likely to benefit. Some schools operate a rotation system for instrumental and vocal lessons.

Provision of instrument and equipment

Instruments may:

- belong to the pupil;
- be borrowed from school;
- be hired from us, by your school;
- be bought through our 'Instrument Purchase Scheme' for pupils taught by our teachers. This scheme enables you to buy a new instrument through your child's school at heavily discounted VAT-free prices (details available from school);
- be bought second-hand following advice from the teacher;
- be bought through one of the rental-purchase schemes operated by most local music shops;

You will probably be asked to provide a tutor book and a few other necessary items, such as reeds and strings.
